

HUNGER CRISIS SUDAN

"Our partners would appreciate continued prayer for the work they do in supporting a very vulnerable population.

- Our Christian partners have been responding to the Sudan hunger crisis for the last 24 months - one of the worst humanitarian crises in the world today, according to ACAPs (a global humanitarian organisation).
- Over 30 million Sudanese people (almost two thirds of the population, and almost half of these are children) are in need of humanitarian assistance.
- Almost 12 million people have been displaced, with many moving into countries already in high humanitarian need and fragility.
- Famine was declared earlier this year in Sudan, impacting 2 million at risk of famine within the 24.6 million facing acute hunger, and healthcare challenges like dengue and cholera. In response to this, our Christian partners have been working in country and across borders on healthcare, nutrition and food responses.
- Reporting for this context is challenging as our partners navigate the complexities of working amidst complex conflict and political situations. As such, we need to be careful about working with our partners in a way that doesn't provide further risk to them or the communities they serve, and that allows them to continue being able to access and provide aid to those most vulnerable."

10th November 2025, Baptist World Aid reported an escalation of violence in Sudan.

Humanitarian Access Scores, July 2025

"South Sudan recorded extreme access constraints from December 2024 to May 2025. This deterioration is mainly the result of violence against aid workers and assets, aid diversion and confiscation, and bureaucratic constraints, such as considerable delays in obtaining clearance for the movement of certain relief items."
